### Pastor's Message

The 6th Commandment - God's gift of Marriage

Our Epistle reading for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday after Pentecost (June 30) was from Galatians 5. In this section of his letter to the church Paul warns against giving in to the desires of the flesh. He argues that such desires are against the Spirit and the desires of the Spirit are likewise against the desires of the flesh. Then he goes on to give several common examples of what those works of the flesh are: "Now the works of the flesh are evident: sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, <sup>20</sup> idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, fits of anger, rivalries, dissensions, divisions, <sup>21</sup> envy, at drunkenness, orgies, and things like these. I warn you, as I warned you before, that those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God." And so that brings us to God's will for us in the 6<sup>th</sup> Commandment:

You shall not commit adultery.

Most certainly this commandment means for us the obvious—don't have sexual relations with someone other than your spouse when you're married. It also clearly means don't have sexual relations with someone else's spouse. Or as Luther put it, "Q: What does this mean for us? A: We should fear and love God so that we lead a sexually pure and decent life in what we say and do, and husband and wife love and honor each other". The 6th commandment of course presupposes that no one would be having sex before they were married. This is *not* the presumption today however. Sex outside of the estate of marriage simply was not permitted at any time in the history of God's people; nor is now and nor will it ever be. Paul above lays out very clearly the fate of those who will not regard God's commandment and it is severe.

The Church seems to fighting a losing battle with respect to this commandment in our culture. "Losing" not in the sense that the Church has changed God's teaching (The Bride and the Groom are one and do not teach differently than one another) but losing in the sense that our influence in this culture is waning. There seems to be a new facet of immorality celebrated every day in our society. And there is at least a correlation between this and a general, across-the-board lack of devotion to Jesus. One (likely many more) might argue that "the times have changed" and that "we've got to change along with them" and "if we don't, then we'll just keep walking down the path all the way to irrelevancy". I'm not opposed to "change", in fact often times change is necessary, but there are a couple of things that are problematic with these and similar statements. One is that the Word of God does not change, nor does the expectation of striving for obedience on our part. "If you love me you will keep my commandments" Jesus says. Secondly, the Church of Jesus Christ was never meant to take its lead from the world and bend ourselves to it. We have been made to be the light of the world by Jesus Christ Himself, illuminating it and leading it to its Savior. It is exactly backwards to say that we should change ourselves to look more like the world and conform to it. It would only be to darken or veil our light and thus do a poorer job at showing the world the Way of Jesus Christ. And yet we seem to be seeing this more and more.

According to the order of creation, marriage is between one man and one woman. We know this by virtue of God's creation of Adam and his wife, Eve. Sexual activity outside of the bounds which God created and established is contrary to God's will for the people he created and should therefore be repented of. And thanks be to God that we have a Savior who desires mercy and not our destruction and who welcomes us back into his arms every time we return to him. Brethren, keep awake, be diligent, know God's holy Word, and never give in to the way of the world and of the flesh, for you are called to the higher things of God.


















### Church Council Meeting

# CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING March 10, 2019 MINUTES OF MEETING

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by President Jay Human

**<u>Devotions:</u>** Emma Human opened the meeting with a devotional reading and prayer.

#### Roll call and action on excuses for absence:

**Present:** Pastor Frye, Jay Human, Gabriel Frye, Jeff Guzman (guest), Emma Human, Joe Keefer, Leonard Lewis, Pat McAlister, Bob Mahovsky, Richard Medlin, Brian Robinson, and Tonya Stone

Absent: Michael Dukes, Tommy Hedrick, Crystyl Human, Nancy Olls

After Roll Call, Bob Mahovsky took time to introduce Jeff Guzman as our new IT administrator. Jeff is a master IT, and we are very happy that he has accepted this important position. Thanks Jeff!

#### Minutes of last meeting:

1) The minutes of the February 10, 2019 Church Council meeting were approved with one correction. Bob made a motion to accept the minutes with one correction. Emma seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### **Reception of New Petitions and Communications**

1) Jay has received a second letter regarding the sale of the Rhyne property and the wishes of Billy and Susie Rhyne upon their deaths. The letter was authored by Norman L. Cloninger, apparently a close friend of the Rhynes. In the letter, Mr. Cloninger states that he understood that the wish of the Rhynes was to liquidate their property and divide the proceeds between their respective churches. Unfortunately, there is nothing in either will to support this.

#### **Report of the Pastor:** Pastoral activities for the month of February, 2019:

- 1) Pastor Frye was sick for almost three weeks with the flu and therefore did not make many visits, none while he was sick. He had 6 pastoral contacts and presided over the Divine Service 5 times, one of which was the Ash Wednesday service. (Pastor Frye was happy to see that Ash Wednesday worship attendance was up the highest it's been since he became the minister at Christ's!) We had one Wednesday Night Bible Study that was led by Tim Cloninger. Pastor Frye also preached at the Community Ash Wednesday Service.
- 2) Lenten Vespers starts this coming Wednesday, March 13, 2019.
- 3) Pastor Frye inquired as to whether we had decided to send another delegate other than him to the Carolinas Mission District, May 17-18, 2019, at Advent Lutheran in North Charleston.
- 4) FYI. The Carolinas Mission District has grown to a size that is increasingly difficult to manage. To promote a better level of local congregational fellowship, the NALC recommends Mission Districts aim for a size of between 10 and 15 congregations. We currently number 50. It will be proposed at our convocation in May, 2019, that the Carolinas Mission District be changed to Carolina Mission Region, which will encompass four smaller mission districts.

- 1) In Michael's absence, Jay reviewed the Designated Funds Report and the Deposits Summary for February, 2019 with Council.
- 2) Crystyl presented the February, 2019, Capital Fund report to Council for review.

**IT Committee:** Jeff Guzman has accepted the position of IT Administrator.

Cemetery Committee: Bob reports that they had a great workday. A large pile of leaves was removed from site.

#### **Unfinished Business:**

1) Please turn in Annual Reports to Julie if you haven't already done so.

2) Backpack Money. There is money that is earmarked for the Backpack Food Program. Since the program is well covered, and we have no requests to support it, Council would like to allocate this money to Springfield Elementary School. The spirit of the donation was that the money be used to help children at Springfield. Council voted to donate the money to use for library books, as Tonya feels that is their greatest need. A discussion followed regarding how much money was available. Michael felt that \$4,000.00 to 4,500.00 was available. Bob wanted to know why we can't use all \$6,200+ that is available. Michael and Jay feel that we should reserve some of the fund so it is available if needed in the future. A "rainy day fund", if you will. Bob disagrees and wanted a vote. Bob also wanted to know if we can control what content these books will have. Tonya defended non-fiction books as books about insects, etc. Council decided to table this discussion. No action will be taken at this time.

#### 3) New Member Drive:

- a) Bob wanted to open the discussion with a comment about Music Camp. This idea came to the forefront of Council's ideas to attract new members. Bob feels there is a lot of interest in music camps. He suggested that we try to get sponsors to help offset the costs of a music camp.
- b) Bob also wanted to discuss the possibility using *Fortnight* as a way to attract youth to church. Emma and Pastor Frye both told Bob that *Fortnight* is not nearly as popular as it once was. This is the problem with basing an attraction on popularity of a game that can become unpopular.
- c) Jay had a list of ideas that he got from a survey of Council members. He wants us to narrow down the number of choices for us to discuss.
- d) Pastor Frye suggests using yard signs to promote the traditional values of our church and the NALC.
- e) Flyers could be sent out that feature a picture of our pastor to attract younger families.
- f) Jeff explained that terms used to describe our church in our website are part of our meta-data. He suggests that we write statements as to why we like our church and post them on our website.

#### g) Jay recommends the following:

- 1) We need youth programs to attract youth. Possibly hire a PT youth Minister.
- 2) Visitor management. Try to retain visitors so they will come back and worship with us.
- 3) Use the Family Life Center to attract townspeople. Possibly a "Night Out" kind of event.
- 4) We will continue this discussion at the next Council meeting.

#### New 2018 Council Business:

- 1) David and Leonard will open and close the church in April and May, 2019.
- 2) All committees are asked to turn in annual reports to Julie ASAP!

#### **Adjournment**:


- 1) The next council meeting will be on April 14, 2019 at 6:00 PM. Bob will lead devotions.
