#### Pastor's Message

#### You shall not murder – The 5th Commandment

What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt nor harm our neighbor in his body, but help and befriend him in every bodily need. God forbids us to take the life of another person –murder, abortion, euthanasia. (*Small Catechism* – Catechism 2008)

Notice the specific language that is used in the above commandment—specifically the word, "murder". In order to have a deeper understanding of God's Word regarding his 5<sup>th</sup> Commandment we need to make a fairly simple distinction between "killing" and "murder". Murder involves specific premeditation and malice in taking the life of another human being. So even though some members of PETA might declare that "Meat is Murder" they are defining "murder" somewhat differently than the way Christians have historically defined it. Christians, and indeed all humans by virtue of the fact that the proscription of murder is extant in the universal natural law, are not allowed to commit murder. There are times, however, that a Christian may have to kill another human being.

Though this teaching of our Lord flies in the face of everything we've been taught in our American culture about standing up for and defending ourselves, Christians are not afforded carte blanche in defending themselves against the violence of others. We must use holy discernment in such matters. For the Lord's instruction is plain: "If someone strikes your right cheek, turn and offer him the other also" and in Romans 12 – "Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." <sup>20</sup> To the contrary, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink…" I didn't say obedience here was easy - but it is without a doubt a submission to the Lord's exhortation to bear the holy Cross as well as an opportunity to pray for your enemies.


It is however a different matter when you are defending another person and particularly someone who is weaker than you are—for example, your children whom you've been given the responsibility of protecting. Because "in Christ" you are in fact your brother's keeper, you not only have the right to defend your brother or sister even with the use of force, you also have the duty to do so. "Rescue the weak and the needy and deliver them from the hand of the wicked" -Psalm 82. Moreover, we should be willing even to give our life for this purpose—

1John 3.16 – "By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers".

The State (the government) also has the right to wield the sword and punish unto death evildoers. Romans 13 – Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities... for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer. Therefore, certain agents of the government are afforded the right to use deadly force, for example, police officers, FBI, CIA, etc. Christians are also allowed to fight and kill as soldiers in just wars.

"You have heard that it was said to those of old. "You shall not murder and whoever murders will be in danger of judgment." But I say to you that whoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of judgment." Here the Lord likens anger at another to murder. Because the sin of murder begins in the heart it's as if we've murdered them in our heart. The penalty of both is exactly the same. And so when anger does overtake us we must cling to Jesus through the great gift of repentance – and as I discussed back in the April newsletter, repentance has two parts: contrition and faith. Repent and know that where we have failed at this commandment, Christ Himself has fulfilled it for us and has become our righteousness –all this through the power and mystery of faith.




Our church donated \$6225.00 to the Media Center at Springfield Elementary to help with their Media center renovations.


