Pastor's Message

On the Summons of the Father and the Ecclesia.

A year-plus of Covid-19 has taken its toll on the lives and souls of the Christian people. We may very well find ourselves doing things differently than before. Some of those things may stick, some may not. We may find ourselves with new habits—some good, some bad. With regard to the latter, and though I certainly cannot know such a thing, I would imagine that universally for the Christian people, worship attendance on Sunday morning has been down and is still down from what it was before March, 2020. Thankfully, God has granted it to humanity to find a vaccine speedily and to discover more effective ways to treat this virus that has kept us apart and in fear for so very long. However, habits are rather easy to form for human creatures and even harder to break. If you think I'm wrong, pay attention to which shoe you put on first tomorrow morning or where you sit next Sunday for worship!



The preeminence of "community" for the Christian people is indispensable. The term "ecclesia" (which means, "the gathered assembly" and is often translated into English as "church") stands in the New Testament 115 times. This assembly of the faithful is summoned by the Father; gathered in by the Holy Spirit; and fed and forgiven into life by Jesus Christ the Great Physician of our souls. The New Testament is quite clear that the only place this happens is within the gathering of this particular ecclesia. This is to say that the gathered assembly is absolutely vital to the life and health of every son and daughter that belongs to God.

This ecclesia of God has suffered over the past year and a half. The pandemic has made all of us into prodigals in one way or another, myself included. We have been confronted with a plague that has made us afraid to come together and so we've stayed apart; a plague that has placed a stumbling block of fear before us when we approach the Lord God Almighty in his Holy Supper at the Altar; a plague that had tempted us to form new habits and new ways of existing in the world.

The world is insistent that we have *lost* many people to Covid-19. In fact, I saw many people blaming the pandemic on Christians because they refused to obey their local governor's executive orders and gathered for worship instead. However, the Christian people live in a completely different and new reality than the rest of the world. For one, the Christians are a people who, like their Master, are accustomed to calling a spade a spade. And because of this, they are completely

satisfied in rejecting the lie that says we have *lost* many people to a virus. In fact, we haven't *lost* any one at all. The reason we haven't lost anyone is because of the peculiar nature that God has given to this called, gathered, and fed people which the New Testament calls "the ecclesia of God". You see this ecclesia belongs to the Holy Trinity. It has been purchased with the blood of Jesus Christ. These people are unimaginably precious to him and he will never let one of them out of his sight and care. He knows and loves every hair on our heads. We would be foolish and faithless to believe that the God who holds and commands all things, simplu abandons the people he has purchased for Himself. All "the world" does is lose people, God never does. Death can never stop the love our Father has for us.

Furthermore, if it's true that he hasn't lost them, then we haven't either. This is another of the peculiarities of these people called the ecclesia of God. Towards the end of last year, I wrote an article on the communion of saints in which I quoted The Rev. Berthold Von Schenk. Speaking of the communion and unity resident within this community of the ecclesia, Von Schenk says: "*How truly blessed we are to be a part of this incredible reality!* ... What we must always remember when we go to the Lord's Supper is that we commune with Christ – and wherever Christ is, there is heaven. And this communion includes all the saints who have died and risen in Christ : Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Ruth, Peter, Paul, our parents and grandparents, perhaps even our spouses or our children, all the saints now living in the world... and those still to come." This is to say, that where Jesus is, there also are all those who have been joined to him by Baptism and faith. Jesus has so united Himself to this ecclesia, that he is "never" apart from them. And so Von Schenk continues, "The sacrament of the Altar is the place of closest meeting with the saints who have died and are in his keeping." Yea verily!

To this community of his ecclesia, the Father sends out the summons even now. Maybe we hesitate for reasons of pandemic, maybe we have other reasons. What we must *not* do is let our hesitation turn into habit. We must trust that our Father is good and fear not, because he wants us to live. He will never call us to something that isn't abundantly good for us and for our salvation. To this ecclesia which he calls us to, the Father has promised to come. There he causes a river of grace to flow to these people—a river of mercy that flows into eternity.

Come to the Father. Hear his summons and know that the One who calls you is merciful, loves you, and calls you to what he knows is best for you.

Contacting the Office




