Pastors Message

The Psalms as the very Soul of our Lord

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. Despite the busyness of our lives, it is not too difficult to perceive (if one sets aside the requisite time with the Word to do so) that throughout our Lord's life he meditated upon the prophecies in the Sacred Scripture. In the course of time and in his prayerful intimacy with his Father, he understood these prophesies as having to do with Himself. I am not certain of how this process came about; what I am certain about is that it did.

The prayer of Jesus is inseparable from who Jesus is. This is to say that in the mind of Jesus there is a never-ending exchange with God the Father Almighty and this exchange forms the boundaries, the recollection, the will, and the quality of the consciousness of the Man, Jesus Christ. It's here in this very consciousness resident within the Man, Jesus that a human being perceives and knows Himself to be the eternally begotten Son of the Father who has been sent into the world to redeem and save those to whom he would become brother. The Son of God, who *from* eternity and *into* eternity, is always reciprocating the Father's love in Himself, does exactly the same thing when he comes to earth, but -now- he does it as a Man, for men.

Because of this, the correct place to meditate upon the meaning of the Incarnation of the Son and his Passion is through the mind of Jesus the Son of God and his never-ending prayer to his Father. For the Preacher of Hebrews says: **Consequently, he is able to save to the uttermost those who draw near to God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them**. (Hebrews 7.25) So therefore, if we want to mediate upon what the Incarnation, the Passion and indeed the entire Atonement means (and we should want to meditate upon these things), then we must know what these things meant to Jesus—for he is the One who gives them their true meaning. And to do that we must seek and ingest what the Sacred Scripture tells us of the mind of Jesus.

This, my brothers and sisters, is not at all difficult to do because the Scripture gives us such a flood of knowledge concerning the prayer life of the eternal Son of God. In fact, the amount we have is astounding! We possess, in our very own hands, prayers from the mind of Christ to his Father that are written down for us—prayers in which we are invited to listen to the very voice of the Son speaking to the Father. This is mercifully given to us in the Book of Psalms. In the Psalms we are invited to peer into mind of Jesus—his desires, his thoughts, his sorrows, his joys as he communes with the Father. When we pray the Psalms *in* and *with* Jesus Christ it's not simply to "peer into" the mystery of Salvation from the outside, rather it is to know the mystery from the inside—

because in the Psalms, the believer is beholding it from inside the mind of the Savior. What we have in the Psalms are the thoughts of Jesus to His Father concerning the Incarnation, Suffering, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension in the form of prayer.

In Bible Study, we have recently read the Psalms from such a place. But don't take my word for it, take Paul's. He is the Church's earliest interpreter of the Psalms when he squarely places upon the lips of Christ: **The reproaches of those who reproached you fell on me**. (Romans 15.3) The "me" of Psalm 69 quoted by the Apostle, is of course Jesus as he suffers at the hands of his enemies, and the "you" is the Father to whom our Lord prays. Seeing the Psalms from this, their real perspective, was not something foreign to the Christians to whom the Word of Truth was first delivered. Indeed, St. John also places part of this Psalm in the mouth of the Son when he says, "**Zeal for your house will consume me.**" (John 2.17). You see, when we pray this Psalm, we do so from the very mind and heart of the Savior as he suffers to save us.

Save me, O God! For the waters have come up to my neck. ² I sink in deep mire, where there is no foothold; I have come into deep waters, and the flood sweeps over me. I am weary with my crying out; my throat is parched. My eyes grow dim with waiting for my God.

We would like to thank the late E. C. Clippard and Carolyn Clippard for presenting these gifts to Christ's Lutheran Church. As Carolyn says "these treasures are now returned to the Church where they belong."

Dear Fellow Members of CELC,

Please plan to attend the annual congregational meeting scheduled for Sunday, November 14, 2021 following 10:30AM worship service.

There are several items to be voted on at this meeting. 1) Vote on the 2022 budget 2) Elect council members for 2022, 3) Vote on proposed change to constitution, (see below), 4) Vote on up to \$110,000.00 expenditure for replacement of HVAC unit for church building. 5) Ratification of decisions made at the NALC Convocation in Corpus Christi, in August 2021 – see at end of this letter.

The voting process will be in accordance with our current constitution which states. "Voting members are confirmed members. Such confirmed members shall have communed and made a contribution of record during the current or preceding year." You must meet these requirements by October 31, 2021 in order to vote at the annual meeting.

The slate of nominees for 2022 Church Council are:

If after receiving this letter, the Lord has moved your heart and you are willing to serve, please notify either Tonya Campbell or Jay Human and they will add your name to the ballot. As always, nominations can be made from the floor as long as the nominee has been previously contacted and has agreed to serve. **Six Council members should be elected.**

Proposed Change to Constitution

Chapter 12 – Church Council 12.05 – C

a. The Church Council may enter into contracts of up to \$15,000 (Changed from \$5,000) for items not included in the budget. In the event of an emergency requiring action to preserve property sooner than the (10) ten days needed for a Congregation Meeting, the Church Council may by two-thirds (2/3) majority of the voting members of the Church Council enter into contracts not exceeding \$15,000 (Changed from \$5,000). This will prevent the need to call a congregational meeting to approve the repair or replacement of future maintenance items like air conditioners. The \$5,000 limit was made many years ago when costs to replace A/C units and the like were much less than they are today.

Replacement of HVAC unit for Church.

The current HVAC unit in the church is 53 years old and in need of being replaced. It is estimated this could cost <u>up to \$110,000.00</u>. Congregational approval and support is needed for this project. Finance Committee, Council and Property Committee; have discussed how this will be financed. Recommendations include Designated Giving, Capital Improvement Fund, Memorial Funds and Endowment request.

We urge everyone to give these important matters careful and prayful consideration and encourage you all to be present for the Annual Congregational meeting on Sunday, November 14, 2021. Yours in Christ,

Dear Congregations and Clergy of the North American Lutheran Church.

Grace and peace to you in the name of God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

One of the NALC's Core Values is "Congregationally Focused." Congregational participation is a foundational principle of our church body's governance. By requiring congregational ratification of certain key decisions, the NALC ensures that its members are aware of and broadly supportive of those decisions.

At our recent NALC Mission Convocation in Corpus Christ, Texas, the delegates to the convocation voted to ratify amendments to Article 11 of the Constitution. As a result, each member congregation is asked to schedule a duly called congregational meeting for the purpose of voting "yes" or "no" to the convocation's action to amend portions of Article 11. A simple majority vote is required. This has to be done at a meeting of the entire congregation and not at a council meeting or any other sub-group meeting. The deadline for voting on the ratification of Article 11 is within six months of the close of the 2021 NALC Mission Convocation — February 6, 2022. It would be best to have a brief specially called meeting of the congregation well in advance of the deadline date.

EXPLANATION OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The 2020 NALC Mission Convocation voted to postpone proposed amendments to Article 11, Regional Subdivisions, of the NALC Constitution. The amendments proposed last year would have named mission districts as the regional subdivision.

There was support for naming them as mission districts. The reason for postponing consideration of the amendments was to revise the amendments so the constitution clearly allows for mission districts to form mission regions. Several mission regions have already been formed in the NALC.

BELOW IS WHAT WAS VOTED ON AND PASSED BY THE DELEGATION:

(Deletions are marked with a strikethrough and additions are in a red font and underlined.)

ARTICLE 11 - REGIONAL SUBDIVISIONS

11.01 Congregations shall join in collaboration_as Mission Districts to fulfill most effectively the ministry and mission of the NALC, normally based on common geographic boundaries. Mission Districts may form Mission Regions for more effective ministry and mission as needed. Mission Regions shall have such organizational form and functions as shall be determined by the constituting Mission Districts. Such organization shall be done in consultation with the Bishop and subject to the approval of the Executive Council.

11.02 Each regional group Mission District or Mission Region of congregations shall adopt appropriate governing documents that are consistent with the governing documents and practice of the NALC and shall include election of a Dean, adoption of a budget, and provision for supervision, mutual support of member congregations, and procedures necessary for carrying out its mission and ministry.


11.03 The Deans, who shall be ordained ministers of the NALC, shall be accountable to the Bishop and work with the Bishop by conducting similar functions in their respective areas Mission Districts. Deans shall serve as pastor to ordained ministers, their families, and congregations, and will conduct a ministry of teaching and visitation with ordained ministers and congregations. Deans may continue to serve under the call of a congregation.

Per the NALC Constitution, Article 17.03 states "Any amendment to this Constitution, prior to becoming effective, must be ratified by a two-thirds majority of congregations (i) that belonged to the NALC at the close of the Convocation that approved the amendment and (ii) that within six months after the close of the Convocation have voted on ratification in and through properly called congregational meetings.

And, "As a responsibility of NALC membership, congregations are expected to vote on the ratification of proposed constitutional amendments. For ratification to be valid, at least 50% of congregations belonging to the NALC at the close of the Convocation that approved the amendments must have voted on the question. Abstentions and invalid ballots shall not be considered for purposes either of counting the number of congregations that have voted on ratification or of determining whether the two-thirds majority has been achieved."
